SUBJECT: CITATION OF UNIT.

TO : Commanding General, Fifth Army,
A.P.O. #464, U. S. Army, (Thru Channels)

1. Under the provisions of Circular Number 333, War Department, 1943, it is recommended that Company "A", 337th Infantry be cited in War Department General Orders for outstanding accomplishment in combat during the period 23 October 1944 to 27 October 1944, near Hill 421, Mt. MEZZANO, Italy.

2. On 23 October 1944, the First Battalion received orders to pass through the Third Battalion, 351st Infantry at Mt. CALDERARO, Italy and attack objective 13, which was Mt. MEZZANO, Italy, a distance of about 2000 yards from the Second Battalion's present position. The First Battalion moved out in a column of Companies, Company "A" leading followed by Companies "B" and "C". The route that the Battalion had to take was under observation and intensive artillery fire from the enemy who held all the commanding ground on both flanks and also to the front. Shortly after Company "A" began its push forward they came under one of the most intense barrages that they had ever experienced. The Company Commander immediately realizing that all approaches were covered and that forward movement by daylight was impossible and would lead to complete annihilation, he quickly summed up the situation and reported to the Battalion C.O., who directed the Battalion to withdraw behind the ridge and make plans for a night attack. This was done and the leaders of the Companies went forward to reconnoiter for routes of approach so that the Battalion could reach the objective safely under the cover of darkness.

The hour set for the attack was 2000 hours and the Battalion moved off on the scheduled time. After reaching a point approximately 700 yards short of the objective the Battalion came under intensive small arms fire and mortar fire and the forward movement was halted. Immediately reconnaissance patrols were sent out, after an accurate check of all surrounding terrain they brought back valuable information that the road and both its shoulders were mined and that the enemy was dug-in in front and on both flanks and also occupied a small town to the rear. On orders the Battalion withdrew to G. RAVINE and organized an all around defensive position. Then the decision was made, because of daylight approaching, that the Battalion would hold up and make reconnaissance patrols for different approaches for a night attack. These patrols were sent out and found new routes and the plans were made to attack at 2200.

Undaunted by the previous unsuccessful attempt, the men of the Battalion started out at 2200 hours, with grim determination not to be turned back for any reason. Their route took them through draws and defiles covered by heavy mortar

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and artillery fire, but their advance was not stopped. At 0500 the morning of 25 October 1944, Company "A" attacked their portion of the Battalion objective with all the power and aggressiveness that characterizes the fighting American Army. They were closely followed by Company "C" who attacked objective 13 from the right. Company "B" had another mission to attack IL POGGIO, Italy to the right rear of objective 13 (Mt. MEZZANO, Italy). In Company "A's" attack they succeeded in driving a determined, ruthless enemy from his well organized position, killing 15 men and capturing 20. The remainder of the Battalion was also successful in their missions. After this highly important objective had been taken an all around defense was organized over an area much too large for a Battalion. Company "A's" position was on the exposed left flank, and therefore was in much danger, because the only unit on their left, was cut off by a large enemy force, which occupied Hill 444, to the left rear of Company "A's" position. Company "B" to the right rear of Company "C" was also cut off by an enemy force at MADENA del LATO. This left Company "A" and "C" practically alone on this important objective. The terrain feature which the Battalion held was the last commanding ground before the FO VALLEY and was very important to the enemy, because from this position he had observation on our lines up to a distance of four (4) miles.

Shortly after Company "A" had completed their defensive position the enemy launched a small counterattack, and after a few minutes of fighting were repelled. Two hours later the enemy again struck back at Company "A", this time with a larger force and only after receiving severe casualties did he withdraw. Immediately following this attack the enemy started placing heavy mortars and artillery fire on Company "A's" position, inflicting several casualties on the men of Company "A". Again not to be out done the enemy attacked a third time but the gallant men of Company "A" stemmed the foe, causing many casualties and driving the enemy away. Shortly after this, a heavy fog engulfed the positions held by Company "A". It was so dense that the men could not see over ten (10) feet from their positions. The already fatigued men of Company "A" realized their peril and remained on the alert throughout the entire night. The night passed without another counterattack but with intensive artillery and mortar fire, causing more casualties in Company "A". The tempo of the enemy artillery and mortar fire increased with every passing hour.

On the night of 25 October 1944, Company "K" came into a position between Companies "B" and "C", but they were still to the rear of the objective and were ready to move if needed.

The dawn of 26 October 1944 brought only heavier fog and more artillery. The enemy made no attempt at Company "A's" position that morning. At 1415 hours a more intense, more devastating barrage than ever before was laid upon Company "A's" position. After thirty (30) minutes of this the barrage lifted only to fall in all draws and approaches leading up to Company "A's" position so that no one from the rear could come to their aid. Company "K" was completely cut off and was forced to remain in position during the entire attack. Company "C" was at this time receiving a counterattack by an enemy force so they were unable to come to Company "A's" aid.

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An enemy force estimated to be one Battalion attacked Company "A". The main enemy force attacked from the left flank, which was exposed, and one Company attacked from the front. Due to the density of the fog it was impossible for Company "A's" protective fire to be placed out in time to repel the enemy force. The assault on the first platoon's position, protecting the left flank of the Company ended in fierce hand to hand fighting with knives and bayonets. The first platoon of Company "A" with attachments from Company "D" fought gallantly but due to the overwhelming strength of the enemy they were finally overpowered after inflicting a casualty toll on the enemy of 25 killed and 10 wounded. The entire first platoon and its attachments, with the exception of two (2) men were either killed or captured and the enemy drove on to the remainder of the Company. These two (2) men played dead and when the enemy's attention was drawn to another part of the hill they crawled back to the second platoon, which was already alerted by the terrific fighting, and took up positions to meet the onslaught.

The enemy drove on but a determined stand by the remaining members of Company "A" withstood the terrific onslaught by the enemy and killed and wounded more than a Company of the attacking force. The men of Company "A" gathered to make a last stand, determined to break the attack if it took the last man. The impregnable defense held and after the enemy was stopped he was less than thirty feet from the main position. The fight settled down to a battle from fox-hole to fox-hole but the few remaining men of Company "A" held their ground and began slowly to take back some of the valuable ground that was lost. The men although few by now and very fatigued held their valuable objective until help finally arrived.

3. Sketches, showing disposition of troops cited, supporting troops, enemy positions, and general terrain features: Inclosed.

4. a. Continuous hills with deep draws was the type of terrain.
- b. Enemy morale: Excellent.
- c. Morale of our troops: Excellent.
- d. Weather: Damp and cold with a dense fog over the area.
- e. Exact time and date of action: From 0800, 23 October 1944 to 1500, 27 October 1944.
5. a. Number of men assigned and attached to unit cited who took part in action:

165 Enlisted Men, 6 Officers, 4 attached Medics, 17 attached from Company "D", 337th Infantry.

- b. Number of casualties suffered by unit cited:

40 Enlisted Men, 1 Officer, 1 attached Medic, 15 attached from Company "D", 337th Infantry.

- c. Approximate strength of supporting troops and character of support

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Rendered by other units.

Company "C", 337th Infantry, - 102 Enlisted Men, 2 Officers. This unit rendered practically no aid because they too were being counter-attacked by another group of enemy.

Company "K", 337th Infantry, - 110 Enlisted Men, 4 Officers. This unit could not come to Company "A's" aid because they were pinned down by artillery and mortar fire.

6. a. Approximate strength of enemy.

One (1) Battalion.

b. Character of enemy fire and observation:

Heavy concentration of mortar and artillery fire, also intensive small arms fire. Enemy observation practically nil, due to heavy fog.

c. Apparent enemy intention and objective:

The enemy's intentions were to retake Mt. MEZZANO (Hill 421), Italy at all cost. This Hill was the last commanding ground between our forces and the PO VALLEY.

d. Losses suffered by enemy:

The enemy lost approximately one (1) and one half (1/2) Companies of men.

7. I have personal knowledge of the facts stated in this recommendation.

8. Proposed Citation:

Company "A", 337th Infantry, 85th Division is cited for outstanding accomplishments in combat. During the period 0800, 23 October 1944 to 1500, 27 October 1944 near Mt. MEZZANO (Hill 421), Italy.

Company "A" cut off from all possible aid by enemy artillery and mortar fire was attacked on 27 October 1944 at 1515 hours on Mt. MEZZANO, Italy, by an enemy force of a Battalion's strength. Fighting gallantly the few fatigued men of this much understrength Company repelled this attack and caused many casualties on the enemy forces. These fighting men held their valuable objective, which was the last commanding ground before the much contested PO VALLEY. They held off a superior enemy force fighting hand to hand from fox-hole to fox-hole until finally help arrived to reinforce their position. The courage of these gallant men was a

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fine example of the fighting American soldier and set a pattern for others to follow.
